Medical progress is reported almost daily, but mainstream medicine has become less and less affordable in our western economies. In The Netherlands, this means that the healthcare system needs to be revised constantly and costs have to be cut to keep it affordable. One solution that can help decrease this problem might be the integration of complementa-

ry therapies into the national healthcare system.

This can be accomplished only by demonstrating that complementary therapies effectively control symptoms and can be blended into national health systems. In developing countries where in great parts there is a lack of general mainstream healthcare, safe and proven effective forms of complementary healthcare can be implemented easily. Complementary therapies are effective, less costly and in general eco friendly, if regulated properly.

Workshops

Round Table Conferences

The topics are: Integrative Oncology in the European Union and the European Federation of Naturopathy. With the conclusions of both round table conferences, dialogues can be opened with insurers and policy makers.

A1. Round Table Conference

European Federation of Naturopathy

In Europe the profession of Naturopath or CAM provider is defined or regulated in some countries whereas in other countries the profession is not recognized or even prohibited. In anticipation of new EU regulation in this part of the healthcare industry the EFN would like to develop a unified competency and education profile to influence upcoming regulation. The goal of the EFN is to guarantee a place for the profession Naturopath in all EU countries. The EFN is an organization which unites professional associations from various EU countries as France, The United Kingdom, Germany, Italy and Switzerland. The board members of these associations will represent their members in this Round Table Conference. A profile will be presented for the profession Naturopath per EU state under current regulation. Point of discussed will be the integration of these profiles into a unified EU model which can be a guideline for political discussion and implementation in European guidelines.

A2. + A3. Round Table Conference

Is there a place for integrative oncology in the European healthcare system of tomorrow?

The society for Integrative Oncology produced guidelines for the safe implementation of complementary healthcare forms in Oncology (Supplement edition march and april 2010). These guidelines are mainly focused on the situation in the United States. In Europe a lot of work has to be done before implementation can be accomplished in the whole of the EU. These guidelines have to be compatible with current EU law and regulation and also have withstand the harmonization which takes place in Healthcare in the EU at the moment. A group of recognized senior scientists and healthcare policy makers and leading insurers will discuss these guidelines and review if such an implementation is desired and possible. This session will take place under the guidance of Professor Peter Johnstone.

B2. Workshop

Mind-Body medicine in Oncology

> Anna Paul

Cancer patients often perceive themselves as radically injured in their capacities to self regulate their health and well being. Their mind literally feels betrayed by their bodies. This condition of hopelessness diminishes their self efficacy and greatly adds to their suffering. At the Clinic for Naturopathy and Integrative Medicine in Essen we have developed a twelve week outpatient Mind/Body Program, according to the Cancer Program of the Mind/Body Medical Institute, Harvard Medical School, Prof. Herbert Benson, that empowers patients to regain responsibility for their own well being.

In addition to their conventional therapies patients learn to use self help strategies like regular exercise and a healthy diet as well as relaxation and mindfulness techniques. To most of our cancer patients the

experience that through applying these measures in their daily lives they can positively influence their condition, opens up a new dimension of well being, strength and hope. The mindful reflexion on self harming cognitive processes and the practice of a more accepting and caring attitude towards themselves and others within a supportive group setting add to this valuable experience. During the program many patients become able to truly change their lives. The Workshop introduces the Mind/Body Cancer Program “Essener Modell” and a practical Training in Mind/Body Intervention.

B3. Workshop

integrative paediatrics

In Europe, collaboration between conventional care and complementary therapies is gaining in popularity, but there is a lack of models for integrating complementary medicine in mainstream medical settings.

Objectives:

- Gain knowledge of care integrative modalities such as mind-body skills, aroma diffusion, massage, nutrition, acupuncture, energy therapies and expressive art therapies.
- Gain knowledge of integrative management of common pediatric outpatient problems such as headaches, infections diseases and mental health challenges.
- Gain knowledge of inpatient integrative medicine approaches emphasizing non drug, holistic symptom management (insomnia, pain, nausea, fatigue).
- Gain knowledge of best practices

in the field of integrative pediatrics worldwide.

- Understand the framework of different models of integrative pediatrics.
- Understand the implication for practice of the various models of IM in hospital settings.
- Gain knowledge of integration strategies in the field of IM (business administrative, fund raising research).
- Formulate: recommendation of integrating complementary therapies in mainstream medical settings.

C1. Workshop

Integrative oncology for nurses

> Otto Langels

The head of the nursing team of the academic clinic Essen-Central, Mr Otto Langels (Department of Internal and Integrative Medicine), will present the workshop: Integrative Oncology for nurses.

The integrative care for cancer patients nurses at this German clinic offer Hydrotherapy according to Kneipp®, a traditional German naturopathic method to stimulate the organism by warm and cold water to activate self-healing mechanisms of the body, as well as cupping- and the traditional Chinese Gua Sha-Massage. The main focus is held on side-effects of chemotherapy, such as: gastrointestinal problems, pain of muscle and joints, depression und fatigue and how to reduce these side-effects.

After a theoretical introduction to the above-mentioned treatments a practical training is planned. The participants can experience the benefits of these techniques and later apply them in their work.

C2. Workshop

Implementation of visualisation techniques in a clinical setting

- > Martine Busch

Complementary Healthcare knows simple interventions which can be implemented in a clinical environment with the goal to offer comfort and relaxation to the patient. In this workshop Martine Busch will present the implementation of two of those interventions: therapeutic touch and visualization techniques during for instance chemotherapy. Both forms are gradually more accepted in Dutch Healthcare institutions. Questions that will be asked are: what makes implementation successful and where does extra care need to be considered?

C3. Workshop

Integrated stepped care in psychosocial support for cancer patients: from oncology nurse interventions to hospitality centers and specialized psychological care.

Patients with cancer do not only have to deal with their physical illness, but they also encounter psychological and social problems. What can be done about this and what level of care gives cancer patients the support required to deal with these emotions?

A senior experienced psychologist will present case studies, evaluations and experiences out of his own practice and reach tools how healthcare providers can communicate in optima forma with their patients.

This program has been put together in collaboration with the Society for Integrative Oncology.

Biographies presenters

Donald I. Abrams, MD

Donald I. Abrams, M.D. is chief of the Hematology-Oncology Division at San Francisco General Hospital, an integrative oncologist at the UCSF Osher Center for Integrative Medicine and Professor of Clinical Medicine at the University of California San Francisco.

He graduated from Brown University in 1972 and from the Stanford University School of Medicine in 1977. After completing an Internal Medicine residency at the Kaiser Foundation Hospital in San Francisco, he became a fellow in Hematology-Oncology at the UCSF Cancer Research Institute in 1980.

During his fellowship, Dr. Abrams spent eight months working in the retrovirology laboratory of Harold Varmus, M.D. during the time that the first cases of AIDS were being diagnosed. He subsequently returned to the clinical arena where he was one of the original clinician/investigators to recognize many of the early AIDS-related conditions.

He conducted numerous clinical trials investigating conventional as well as complementary therapies in patients with HIV including therapeutic touch, Traditional Chinese Medicine interventions, medicinal mushrooms and distant healing.

His interest in botanical therapies led him to pursue a two-year Fellowship in the Program in Integrative Medicine at the University of Arizona which he completed in December 2004. His particular passion in the field involves nutrition and cancer. Since completing his Fellowship, Dr. Abrams has been providing Integrative Medicine consultation to people living with and beyond cancer at the UCSF Osher Center for Integrative Medicine where he served as Director of Clinical Programs from August 2006 to December 2008. He has returned to clinical investigation in integrative oncology with interests in medicinal mushrooms, Traditional Chinese Medicine interventions and nutrition.

He co-edited an Oxford University Press textbook in Integrative Oncology with Andrew Weil, M.D. Dr. Abrams is currently the President of the Society of Integrative Oncology.

Martine Busch

Martine Busch is director of the Van Praag Institute which focuses on education and implementation of complementary healthcare forms. The Van Praag Institute also supports and cooperates in clinical research. Martine Busch is frequently invited nationally and internationally to speak about these topics and is currently developing with Elsevier a CD with visualization exercises for specific healthcare problems.

Barrie R. Cassileth, MS, PhD

Dr. Cassileth is Laurance S. Rockefeller Chair and Chief of the Integrative Medicine department at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center. As a researcher, educator and planner, Dr. Cassileth has worked in integrative medicine and psychosocial aspects of cancer care for over 30 years. She developed prototypic programs

in patient and family support, medical education, homecare and hospice, and research in integrative medicine while a faculty member in Medicine and Associate Director of the Comprehensive Cancer Center at the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia.

In 1999 she was recruited to Memorial Sloan-Kettering to create an integrative medicine department, which has become an international prototype. She is founding president of the international Society for Integrative Oncology and Founding Editor-in-Chief of its Journal, and associate editor or advisory board member of eleven medical journals internationally.

She was a founding member of the Advisory Council to the National Institutes of Health Office of Alternative Medicine, now the Center for Complementary and Alternative Medicine. She was on the national Board of Directors of the American Cancer Society and is now on the ACS Eastern Board. She served on many NIH, ASCO and other national panels and committees.

Her publications include 160 articles in the medical literature 40 medical textbook chapters and 20 books for physicians, patients and families. She is Principal Investigator of several NIH research protocols, heads an NIH "Botanical Research Center," and was director of the first National Cancer Institute training program in Integrative Oncology for physicians. Primary books include "The Alternative Medicine Handbook: The Complete Guide to Alternative and Complementary Therapies" and Cassileth et al "Herb-Drug Interactions in Oncology" second edition, 2010 and "Integrative Oncology: Complementary therapies in cancer care." She is proud to serve with Mischa Nagel as co-organizer of this 2010 Amsterdam conference.

Lorenzo Cohen, PhD

Dr. Lorenzo Cohen is a faculty member at the M. D. Anderson Cancer Center and is a professor in the Department of Behavioral Science, Director of the Integrative Medicine Program, and Chief of the Section of Integrative Medicine in the Department of General Oncology.

Dr. Cohen is a founding member of the Society for Integrative Oncology and Editor-in-Chief of the Journal of the Society for Integrative Oncology. He is currently conducting a number of NIH-funded and non-funded randomized controlled clinical trials. They examine the biobehavioral effects of psychosocial interventions aimed at reducing the negative aspects of cancer treatment and improving quality of life. The studies include stress management, emotional writing, meditation, yoga and tai chi/qigong.

He is interested in examining different types of complementary programs that can be easily incorporated into conventional treatment to decrease the psychophysiological sequelae associated with treatment. His research simultaneously assesses psychological, behavioral and physiological factors in an attempt to better understand the cancer process. He is principal investigator of a center grant from the National Cancer Institute to conduct collaborative research projects with Fudan University Cancer

Hospital in Shanghai, China, that is exploring the use of traditional Chinese Medicine for cancer.

Jacqueline Filshie

Jacqueline Filshie is a consultant in Anaesthesia and Pain Management at the Royal Marsden Hospital and Honorary Senior Lecturer at the Institute of Cancer Research. She is a past Chairman of the British Medical Acupuncture Society and a past President of ICMART. Dr Filshie has co-edited three textbooks – ‘Medical Acupuncture: A Western Scientific Approach’, ‘Anaesthesia and Malignant Disease’ and more recently with Adrian White and Mike Cummings, ‘An Introduction to Western Medical Acupuncture’. She has written and lectured widely on acupuncture, complementary medicine and anaesthesia. She has a special interest in acupuncture for pain and symptom control in cancer patients. Dr Filshie is committed to integrating acupuncture into mainstream medicine and increasing the evidence base for medical acupuncture.

Fabio Firenzuoli, MD

Fabio Firenzuoli, MD, graduated in Medicine cum laude (University of Florence, 1984) and is founder and President of ANMFIT (Italian National Association of Medical Phytotherapists, 1995). He is chairman of Clinical Center of Natural Medicine, S. Giuseppe Hospital, Empoli, Italy, director of referring center of Phytotherapy of Tuscany Region and of the School of Natural Medicine.

He is adjunct Professor Clinical Phytotherapy, School of Medicine, University of Florence, (Vice-coordinator and teacher of Master degree on Clinical Phytotherapy, II[^] level), and teacher of many other courses of the University of Pisa, Bologna, Italian National Institute of Health

Firenzuoli is author of many professional books and scientific publications about herbal medicine and phyto-pharmacovigilance.

Peter A.S. Johnstone

William A. Mitchell Professor and Chair of Radiation Oncology, Indiana University, Indianapolis

Peter Johnstone received his undergraduate degree in chemistry from the United States Naval Academy in 1979, and served in the Navy until retirement in 2003. He earned a Master’s degree in Communication from Oklahoma University in 1985, and his medical degree from the Uniformed Services University of Health Sciences School of Medicine, Bethesda, MD, in 1989. His Residency in Radiation Oncology was with the National Cancer Institute in 1993, and he completed additional training in Medical Acupuncture at the University of California, Los Angeles. In 2007, he was recruited to IU School of Medicine as Chair and William A. Mitchell Professor of Radiation Oncology.

His research interests include cancer survivorship; specifically, he has piloted the use of Complementary and Alternative Therapies for symptom relief. Dr. Johnstone is known internationally for publications on using acupuncture to help patients recover salivary function after head and neck radiation therapy, and on the use of manipulative therapy for lymphedema. He and his team have studied the role of health disparities in treatment decisions and outcomes for underprivileged patients with breast, lung, and head and neck cancer, as well as the unique needs of young adult survivors of pediatric cancer.

Dr. Johnstone is a Fellow of the American College of Radiology, and in 2007 served as President of the Society for Integrative Oncology. He is currently Secretary of the American Radium Society (www.americanradiumsociety.org). In early 2006 he was named a Fellow of the American College of Radiology. He is the Radiation Oncology Chair (Genitourinary Category) of the ABR Written Examination, and Vice Chair of the ACR Committee on Appropriateness Criteria. He was named Editor-in-Chief of the journal Current Problems in Cancer in mid-2000, and serves on the Editorial Boards of the International Journal of Radiation Oncology, Biology, Physics, the Journal of Surgical Oncology, the Journal of the American College of Radiology, and the Journal of the Society for Integrative Oncology.

Dr. Michelle Kohn, MBBS BSc MRCP

Dr. Kohn is a specialist advisor in integrative and supportive cancer care. She qualified in medicine at University College and Middlesex School of Medicine, London (1990), with a distinction in pharmacology and therapeutics. Having completed further

medical training to become a member of the Royal College of Physicians, she pursued her interest in integrative oncology, developing program for Macmillan Cancer Support and Breakthrough Breast Cancer, amongst others.

She has been a member of the Complementary Therapies Clinical Studies Development Group of the National Cancer Research Institute (NCRI) since its inception.

Dr Kohn presents nationally and internationally on the state of integrative oncology in the UK. She continues to work closely with institutions and organisations in the USA, including the NCI and the Society for Integrative Oncology, of which she is a former board member.

More recently Dr. Kohn has applied her interest in providing comprehensive cancer care to the evolving field of cancer survivorship. The challenge of developing services to reflect patients' ongoing needs – be they physical, psychological, emotional and practical – is the focus of her current activity. In November 2009, Dr Kohn was appointed to develop and lead a program for the London Oncology Clinic.

Otto Langels

Otto Langels is a trained male nurse at the Department for Internal and Integrative Medicine of Kliniken Essen-Mitte (Germany) specialized in Complementary and Integrative patient care on methods to activate the self-healing mechanisms of the body, such as Hydrotherapy according to Kneipp®, as well as cupping- and the traditional Chinese Gua Sha-Massage. Besides that he is a trained medical lay practitioner (Heilpraktiker) and yoga teacher certified according to the IYENGAR® technique. He has a long standing experience in caring for patients, suffering from internal and chronic pain diseases. Since January 2010 he is program director of the integrative patient care for cancer patients.

Janet Lloyd-Jones, Lic Ac, MBAcC, member of BMLA and WALT

Janet Lloyd Jones is a Registered Acupuncturist and Low Level Laser Therapist. She qualified in 1989 from the College of Traditional Acupuncture, Leamington Spa and set up own human practice in Nailsworth, Gloucestershire. In 2002 she completed TCM post-grad studies at The College of Integrated Chinese Medicine, Reading. She is a member of the British Medical Laser Association and WALT and completed the BMLA 'Core of Knowledge' together

with Laser Therapy courses run by Omega Lasers, Acu-Medic, Thor International and the National Health Service.

Since 2007 she is working closely with Omega Laser Systems developing lecture programs in Low Level Laser Therapy and Laser Acupuncture, in both the human and animal fields. Currently she is re-evaluating the success of treatment protocols developed at Lansdown Veterinary Hospital, and trialled at Sportability, using Laser Acupuncture to benefit both human and animal paralysis.

Dr. rer. medic. Anna Paul

Dr. Anna Paul, Master in Social Work, is the Head of Mind-Body Medicine Department of Internal Medicine V: Complementary and Integrative Medicine, of the Knappschafts-Hospital (Essen-Central Clinic, Essen, Germany) since 1999.

After finishing her Master in Social Work with specialization in Adult Education and qualification in Theology she worked as assistant in the Catholic University Community in Munich, Germany. Through different training and continuous education she became instructor in Health training with a focus on Psychosomatic Health Training based on Yoga and Ayurveda. She has also a basic education in Mindfulness-based Stress Reduction (MBSR). Beside that she was trained in Harvard Medical School (Boston, USA) for the qualification as Mind-Body Medicine Instructor.

Her main focus of work in the Essen-Central Clinic is the Development and Integration of methods in Mind-Body Medicine in clinical patient care and the scientific research and teaching of Mind-Body Medicine as preventive methods and health promotion.

Inès von Rosenstiel, MD

Paediatrician Inès von Rosenstiel practices Integrative Medicine at the Slotervaartziekenhuis in Amsterdam. She was one of the first doctors to do so in the Netherlands and nationally she is still considered a pioneer in this field. She continuously shares her knowledge on a national and international level by giving lectures on her insights and experiences.

Von Rosenstiel is president and co-founder of NIKIM, a collaboration of Dutch specialists for spreading information and knowledge about Integrative Medicine in the Netherlands. NIKIM also assists medical doctors who are looking for help on this subject by bringing them into contact with each other.

Dr Stephen M. Sagar, BSc (Hons) MB BS MRCP FRCR FRCPC

Dr. Sagar is a full professor in the Departments of Oncology and Medicine at McMaster University, Hamilton, Ontario, and a radiation oncologist at the Juravinski Cancer Centre, Hamilton Health Sciences, and the Brain-Body Institute.

Sagar graduated from Kings College and St. Georges Hospital, London, UK with a first class honors BSc in pharmacology and a distinction in pathology. He has published about 70 manuscripts, 8 book chapters and one book.
